# WA Sexually Transmissible Infections and Blood-borne Virus Strategies 2019-2023 – Implementations Plans






The five WA Sexually Transmissible Infections and Blood-borne Virus Strategies 2019-2023 are broken down into six primary areas that demonstrate alignment with the 2018-2022 National Blood Borne Viruses and Sexually Transmissible Infections Strategies.

### **Action Areas:**


- 1. Prevention and education

The WA strategies are underpinned by 10 guiding principles that are in place to support and drive evidence-based and high quality services, education and programs.

Flexible responses to changes in epidemiology, emerging priority populations, service needs and changing prevention and treatment landscapes are all supported by these principles, and provide a foundation for the implementations plans moving forward.




### The Purpose and Scope of the Implementation Plans

- The plans will provide capacity for annual reporting, monitoring and updating over the life of the strategies.
- Via these plans, SHBBVP will be responsible for regular reporting to the WA Sexual Health and Blood-borne Virus Advisory Committee (WA SHaBBVAC).
- The plans will facilitate;
  - review of STI/BBV activities as aligned with each strategy
  - identification of gaps in action and activity areas
  - review of alignment strength between key actions areas and activities
  - The development of an annual reporting framework to report against the key action areas and the defined targets of each strategy

#### What now and next....

- Currently an 'activity and priority populations' mapping exercise is being facilitated by SHBBVP with:
  - Non-government organisations
  - Aboriginal Community Controlled health Services
  - WA Country Health Services
  - Metro Area Health Services
  - Aboriginal Health Services
- The analysis of these mapping exercises will assist SHBBVP to identify gaps and potential funding requirements across the duration of the strategies.
- Draft monitoring framework to capture targets and indicators.


