

Health (Pesticides) Regulations 2011 - Signage Requirements

Signage on Vehicles Required When Involved with the Spraying of Verges and Parks.

From the 1st February 2011, it is a requirement under Regulation 88 of the *Health* (*Pesticides*) *Regulations 2011*, that a sign be fixed to a vehicle which is involved with the application of a liquid pesticide on a verge or park. Lettering must be a minimum of 50mm in height and should be placed on the vehicle so it is easy to see by road users. The sign is to have the words 'CAUTION: (*NAME OF CHEMICAL*) BEING APPLIED, trade name is acceptable or active constituent. A flashing yellow light is also to be fitted to the vehicle and be activated while the vehicle is moving.



Signage for Spraying in Public Places.

From the 1st February 2011, it is a requirement under Regulation 89 of the *Health* (*Pesticides*) Regulations 2011, that whenever a liquid pesticide is being applied on a public place, appropriate warning sign/s is displayed until the pesticide has dried. Lettering on the sign must be a minimum of 50mm in height. The warning sign/s must display the words' CAUTION (*NAME OF CHEMICAL*) BEING APPLIED, AVOID CONTACT WITH AREA WHEN SIGN IS DISPLAYED. Trade name or active constituent may be used. Note: Signs are not required where spraying is being carried out on a verge or park adjacent to a public road.
